CIVIL MONETARY PENALTIES

Commerce has issued a final rule effective December adjusting for inflation each civil monetary penalty within jurisdiction of the Department. Also included is the regulation implementing the 2002 statute which increased the penalties associated with late or incorrect filing of export documentation SED information) from \$1,000 to \$10,000. 69 Fed. Reg. 74416 (Dec. 14, 2004).

C-TPAT

Customs has issued a first and second draft of proposed minimum security standards for importers interested in participating in C-TPAT. clear that Customs intends to shift from voluntary recommendations to minimum requirements. firm's C-TPAT plan exceeds current requirements.

MISC. TRADE ACT OF 2004

On December 3, 2004. President Bush signed Miscellaneous Trade and Technical Corrections Act of 2004 (H.R. 1047) that includes:

- Many duty suspensions ranging from chemicals to night I.D. - DUTY REDUX vision goggles with varying Refunds are provided in certain instances. There may be FTZ Clients should opportunities. carefully review the list; we are preparing a repeal statute now for a U.S. producer.
- Miscellaneous trade provisions include new а reconfigured entry, application of **AGOA** amendments, repeal 1916 AD Act, new sock labeling, Chapter and 99 technical amendments, etc.

Customs is drafting clarifying regulations on weekly entry, etc.
