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HUAWEI DIRECT PRODUCT RULE

The Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) has published an Interim Final Rule, effective May 15, 2020, relating to General Prohibition Three (the "direct product rule"). Under this new rule, foreign products made from U.S. technology, regardless of the reason for control, are prohibited from being sold to entities on the Entity List when there is a special footnote designation. Currently this rule only applies to sales or exports to specified Huawei entities. Comments are due by July 14. 85 Fed. Reg. 29849 (May 19, 2020).

301 COVID-19 EXCLUSIONS

Requests for China Section 301 exclusions for products related to the COVID-19 pandemic are due by June 25 unless extended. No COVID-19 product exclusions have been approved to date. Unlike other Section 301 product exclusion requests, COVID-19 product exclusion requests need to be filed using the Regulations.gov website. COVID-19 COUNTERFEITS

CBP has seized a significant amount of prohibited test kits, counterfeit face masks, chloroquine tablets, etc. Clients are reminded to be very diligent in ensuring that only U.S. approved or authorized COVID-19 merchandise is imported into the United States. ITAR & COVID-19

The Directorate of Defense Trade Controls (DDTC) has issued a request for relating comments to temporary modifications, suspensions. and exceptions to several provisions in the International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR). The proposal is an effort to maintain continuity of operations during the COVID-19 pandemic. The temporary measures include extended license expirations. Comments are due by June 25. 85 Fed. Reg. 35376 (June 10, 2020).

CUSTOMS BROKER RULE

CBP and Treasury have issued Proposed Rules to substantially amend the governing regulations customs brokers. Among the proposed changes are moving all brokers from forty (40) Customs Districts to national permits, supervision and control requirements, transferring all broker oversight from Port Directors to Centers

- USMCA deployment in ACE has been scheduled for July 1, the same day that the USMCA goes into force. As a result, expect delays and other issues on July 1 for USMCA entries.

USMCA DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Chuck Grassley (R-lowa) has indicated that Mexico's blocking of biotechnology and pesticide imports will be a basis of once USMCA goes into effect.

USMCA MPF REFUNDS

Senator Tim Scott (R-SC) has introduced a bill to allow Merchandise Processing Fee refunds on postimportation USMCA preference claims. This was not included in the USMCA legislation previously passed.

SECTION 232 PROCESS

BIS has issued a Final Rule seeking public comments on Section 232 steel and aluminum exclusion product criteria. The Section 232 exclusion process has a significant amount of criticism. Comments are due by July 10.85 Fed. Reg. 31441 (May 26, 2020). Contact Brian Murphy with questions.

HONG KONG

- On May 27 China announced its intention to unilaterally impose national security legislation on Hong Kong.
- The U.S., Australia, Canada, and United Kingdom released statement on May 28.
- On May 29 President Trump indicated that the U.S. would begin a process to revoke Hong Kong's special treatment, including its more lenient export controls for dual-use technologies and recognition as a separate customs territory with duty free U.S. imports. However, official changes have not yet been made.

- On May 21, 2020, the U.S. Trade (USTR) announced Representative seventy-eight (78) new China Section 301 List 3 product exclusions.
- On June 3, the USTR announced the process for requesting extensions to certain China Section 301 List 3 product exclusions approved in late April and May that are set to expire on August 7,
- On June 8, the USTR issued a Notice of thirty-four (34) new China Section 301 List 4A product exclusions covering certain unbleached woven fabrics of cotton and thirty-two (32) new product-specific descriptions covering a variety of goods such as certain lithiumion batteries, optical channel splitters, LCD main board assemblies and modules, down, cyanuric chloride, plastic mop fittings, Chinese language books, gloves, pillow and comforter shells, steel round wire, brass valves, plastic safety spectacles, wristwatch parts, child safety seat parts, and fish hooks. SYRIAN REGULATIONS

The Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) has published a Final Rule relating to dealings with Syria. The new OFAC regulations relate primarily to blocked parties and persons and entities on the OFAC Specially Designated Nationals (SDN) List. Licenses and regulations pertaining to other exports, reexports, or transfers to Syria remain in violation of U.S. laws. under the jurisdiction of the Export Administration Regulations (EAR) administered by the BIS. 85 Fed. The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) announced in a June 3 press release, that it is seeking a \$20 million forfeiture from Kenneth Zong, a U.S. citizen who allegedly attempted to convert 2020. 85 Fed. CHINESE ENTITY LIST ADDITIONS

The BIS has added 33 Chinese companies and government entities to its Entity List. The entities were added based on proliferation activities and human rights concerns. 8 5 Fed. Reg. 34495 (June 5, 2020); 85 Fed. Reg. 34503 (June 5, 2020).

U.S.-CHINA TRADE WAR IMPACT

The Federal Reserve Bank of New York has published a report indicating that \$1.7 trillion of market value has been cut from U.S. companies by the U.S.-China trade war. In addition, almost all the costs of the higher tariffs on Chinese imports fell on U.S. companies. Companies that export to China became less profitable due to retaliatory tariffs.

CHINA AUTOMOTIVE ORIGIN

CBP Headquarters has ruled that a Chinese origin shock absorber that was assembled in Malaysia with a wide range of other Malaysian origin components into an automotive suspension system was Chinese origin because the shock absorber was the essence of the suspension system and was not substantially transformed by the activity in Malaysia. TSCA PFAS VIOLATIONS

Swix Sport on Cat USA (Swix) has reached an agreement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to pay a civil penalty of \$375,625 and develop an educational program to raise awareness in ski communities about PFAS chemicals in ski waxes. Swix violated TSCA premanufacturing notice requirements and import certification requirements with respect to six different PFAS chemicals on at least 83 occasions

CHEMICAL COMPANY PENALIZED

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) announced on June 10 that Natural Advantage LLC, a Louisiana chemical manufacturer, had agreed to a deferred prosecution agreement whereby Natural Advantage will pay \$1,938,650. Natural Advantage is accused of manufacturing and selling "List 1" chemicals without the proper permits and authorizations from the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA). Executives for Natural Advantage are also being charged.
