#### **NEW CHINA EXPORT CONTROLS**

On October 7, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) issued a lengthy Interim Final Rule that adds export advanced on semiconductors (integrated circuits), supercomputers. production equipment, components, and related software and technology destined to China. The rule imposes a mix of new Export Control Classification Numbers (ECCNs), end use controls, and three new Foreign Direct Product (FDP) rules covering foreign products made with U.S. technology for certain end uses in China. The rule also adds 28 Chinese entities to the Entity List. Staged implementation began October 7. Comments are due by December 13. Contact Sean Murray or Chuck Ballard with questions. 87 Fed. #### **UNVERIFIED LIST**

BIS issued a Final Rule that added 31 entities, including Chinese semiconductor manufacturer Yangtze Memory Technologies, to the Unverified List. The Final Rule also includes guidance on criteria and activities for adding entities to the Entity List. 87 Fed. Reg. 61971 (Oct. 13, 2022).

#### **ANTI-BOYCOTT PENALTIES**

BIS has issued a Final Rule modifying its policy on enforcing antiboycott rules. In addition to enhanced penalties, the policy includes an increased focus on foreign subsidiaries of U.S. companies. Contact Bryan Brown with questions. 87 Fed. Reg. 60890 (Oct. 7, 2022).

## **RUSSIAN SANCTIONS**

On September 30, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) designated over 300 parties in response to Russia's "sham referenda" and attempt to annex territory and issued Ukrainian guidance that foreign parties outside of Russia could be designated for providing economic or political assistance in these efforts. BIS concurrently added 57 parties to the Entity List, 50 of which will also be subject to the Russia-Belarus Military End User Foreign Direct Product (FDP) Rule.

#### **FORCED LABOR REPORT**

- The Department of Labor has issued its 2022 List of Goods Produced by Child Labor or Forced Labor (TVPRA List). The report has 32 additions from the 2021 report and includes products and countries not already covered by Withhold Release Orders (WROs). The report also highlights concerns with clean energy supply chains, forced labor in Chinese polysilicon production, and child labor in Congo cobalt mining. Clients should review for potential forced labor targeting and risk assessment.
- The Department of Labor is requesting comments and information for use in three reports it issues on child and forced labor in foreign countries. Comments are due by December 16. 84 Fed. Reg. 60200 (Oct. 4, 2022).

#### **INFANT FORMULA IMPORTS**

- The Food & Drug Administration (FDA) has extended its policy of "enforcement discretion" until January 6 for the importation of infant formula that does not meet all regulatory requirements. In addition, FDA has published guidance to help manufacturers determine whether their products meet the requirements.
- On October 10, President Biden signed the "Bulk Infant Formula to Retail Shelves Act" into law. The Act temporarily eliminates duties through December 31, 2022, on base powder to be used in domestic production of baby formula. H.R. 8982 (Oct. 10, 2022); CSMS #53599807 (Oct. 12, 2022).

# **CHINA 301 REVIEW**

On October 12, the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) announced the next steps in its fouryear review of the Section 301 Lists 1 and 2 additional duties on Chinese products. USTR is requesting public comments by January 17, 2023 on the effectiveness of the additional duties in eliminating unfair Chinese trade practices and their impact on the U.S. economy. USTR is to post specific questions on November 1 and open its electronic portal for submitting answers and comments on November 15. 87 Fed. Reg. 62914 (Oct. 17, 2022).

#### **BROKER REGS REVISED**

On October 17, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) released a Final Rule on the modernization of customs broker regulations in 19 C.F.R. Part 111. The substantial changes include moving all brokers to single national permits, revising the broker responsible supervision and control framework, ensuring customs business is conducted within the U.S., and requiring direct broker communications with importers.

#### **USER FEES INCREASE - MPF**

Clients are reminded that CBP announced in August that 23 separate user-fees will increase by 18.62% for fiscal year 2023. These increases went into effect October 1. The Customs Merchandise Processing Fee (MPF) maximum increased from \$538.40 to \$575.35, an increase of \$46.95. 87 Fed. Reg. 46973 (Aug. 1, 2022).

# **FMC CHARGES COMPLAINT**

- The Federal Maritime Commission (FMC) has posted a notice that furniture maker Philip Reinisch Company, LLC filed a Complaint against NVOCC Flexport Int'l LLC alleging Shipping Act invoicing violations for detention and demurrage charges. 87 Fed. Reg. 60401 (Oct. 5, 2022).
- F M C is requesting public comments by December 13 on a Proposed Rule that requires common carriers and marine terminal operators to include specific information on demurrage and detention invoices and outlines certain billing practices. 87 Fed. Reg. 62341 (Oct. 14, 2022).

# DOT CONTAINER INQUIRY

The Department of Transportation

Redelivery Notices will be sent by CBP via the ACE Portal (or mailed to the importer if it has not opted to receive forms electronically), with a copy also emailed to the FDA and the customs broker if the importer has not designated brokers to receive notices via the ACE Portal. The FDA will first issue a postrelease refusal notice, which CBP will follow with the CBPF 4647 (i.e., joint FDA/CBP more notices). # **FIRST SALE RULE**

CBP has ruled that there was no bona fide "first sale" between a U.S. importer and a related middleman who placed orders with and paid unrelated foreign manufacturers for orders it received from the U.S. importer because, despite delivery to the middleman being FOB, the U.S. importer actually bore the risk of loss by paying for freight and insurance costs from the foreign port and because title to the merchandise transferred directly from the foreign manufacturers to the U.S. importer. # THERMOTRON BIS SETTLEMENT

BIS has entered into a settlement with agreement Thermotron Industries of Holland, Michigan, whereby the company admitted to exporting an environmental test chamber to South Korea without the required license. As part of the settlement agreement, Thermatron is subject to a two-year probationary If it commits an export period. controls violation during this period or fails to satisfy other terms of the settlement, Thermotron will have its export privileges denied for two

#### **USMCA AUTO COMMENTS**

In its investigation into the economic impact and operation of the USMCA Automotive Rules of Origin, the U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) has extended the deadline to submit written submissions to November 25. The public hearing is on November 3. 87 Fed. Reg. 60706 (Oct. 6, 2022).

#### **FABRIC OR PARTS?**

The U.S. Court of International Trade (CIT) has ruled that synthetic fabric net wraps used to bale hay are properly classified as warp knit KD KIT HTS & DUTIES in HTSUS subheading 6005.39.00 rather than as parts of harvesting or agricultural machinery in HTS Headings 8433 or 8436. RKW Klerks v. U.S., CIT Slip Op. <u>22-115</u> (Oct. 4, 2022).

#### **DUTY & QUOTA FREE TEXTILES**

Committee the Implementation of Textile Agreements (CITA) has published the 12-month cap on duty and quotafree imports of certain apparel and requirements. Contact Brian Murphy textiles imported from designated sub-Saharan African countries. 87 Fed. Reg. 57681 (Sept. 21, 2022).

has agreed to remit more than \$24 million, a record fine, to the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) for sanctions violations. Bittrex had reason to know, but failed to screen and prevent persons from Cuba, Syria, Sudan, and Crimea from using its platform without the required licenses.

#### **DOD LIST**

On October 5, the Department of Defense (DoD)  $\underline{\text{released}}$  the  $\underline{\text{names}}$ of 13 Chinese companies with ties to the Chinese military. At least two of the companies are on the BIS Entity List, but the other 11 companies are not currently on any other restricted parties list. These companies should be treated as red flags.

#### **STATE DEPT SANCTIONS**

The U.S. State Department has imposed sanctions on three entities (from China, India, and Turkey) and one Chinese individual for engaging in proliferation activities involving weapons of mass destruction or missile systems. The Indian entity, Synnat Pharma, is a pharmaceutical chemicals manufacturer. 87 Fed. Reg. 62484 (Oct. 14, 2022).

#### **CBP STAFFING**

CBP has a shortfall of about 1,800 officers and expects staffing needs to increase. According to Pete Flores, Executive Assistant Commissioner of CBP's Office of Field Operations, CBP is trying to make up for the shortfall with efficiency improvements.

# **CHINA ORIGIN**

CBP has proposed the revocation of rulings that the origin of certain air purifiers assembled in Vietnam from Chinese and Vietnamese components, including a Chinese motor, is China. Comments are due by November 11. 56 Cust. B. & Dec. 70 (Oct. 12, 2022).

# U.S. TRADE YEAR IN REVIEW

The U.S. International Trade Commission has issued its 2021 Year in Trade report. The report summarizes the global trade environment, U.S. trade laws, and U.S. free trade agreements. 2021 was the first year since the World Trade Organization (WTO) was established in 1995 that the U.S. was not a complaining party or a named respondent in a new WTO dispute filing. USITC Pub. No. 5349 (Aug. 2022).

The Thailand Supreme Court has ruled that Toyota Motor Thailand owes approximately \$270 million in duties and taxes for importing complete knock-down (KD) kits for assembling Prius models that were ineligible for the reduced duty rate for auto parts under the Japan-Thailand free trade agreement. This is a reminder that kit importers need to carefully analyze imported contents versus Customs with questions.

(DOT) has requested comments on determining the best locations for storing and transferring cargo containers and other freight. The purpose of the request is to help relieve congestion at U.S. ports. Comments are due by October 26. 87 Fed. Reg. 58432 (Sept. 26, 2022).

#### FTZ BOARD WEBSITE

Clients are encouraged to review the FTZ Board OFIS website for the detailed listing of their FTZ project. If errors are identified, the Grantee should be contacted to correct the errors. It is important that all FTZ firm information on the OFIS website be accurate.

#### **SUBZONE SITES**

FTZ clients intending to increase their number of subzone sites should contact the firm early in the process. CBP is extremely shortstaffed, and confirmation that CBP will be able to provide oversight should be secured prior to finalizing related real estate transactions. #### **AES POST-DEPARTURE PILOT**

Census has cancelled the Advanced Export Information (AEI) pilot program initiated in 2014. The pilot allowed participants to submit a limited set of Electronic Export Information (EEI) in accordance with regular requirements and provide the full EEI within five days of export. Census cancelled the pilot program due to a lack of adequate participation. Contact Sean Murray with questions. 87 Fed. Reg. 62303 (Oct. 14, 2022).

# IC EXPORT VIOLATION

A Florida man has <u>pled</u> guilty to conspiring to export programmable space-grade integrated circuits to China and Russia in violation of the International Emergency Economic Powers Act, which is punishable by up to five years in federal prison.

#### **QUARTERLY INTEREST RATES**

CBP has announced that the fourth quarter 2022 interest rates used in calculating interest on overdue accounts and refunds of Customs duties have increased by 1% from the previous quarter. 87 Fed. Reg. 57502 (Sept. 20, 2022).

# **GSP AND PACIFIC ISLANDS**

The U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) has <u>indicated</u> it supports expanding Congress Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) by designating the Pacific Islands Forum states as developing regional association for GSP purposes.
