#### "AG" TARIFF REDUCTIONS

Executive Order 14360 eliminated International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA) Reciprocal Tariffs on 237 agricultural HTSUS classifications and 11 additional categories of agricultural products effective for goods entered on or after November 13. The exempted goods include certain beef cuts, cashews, coffee, cocoa beans, fertilizers, etc. 90 <u>Fed</u>. <u>Reg</u>. <u>54091</u> (Nov. 25, 2025); CSMS #<u>66814923</u> (Nov. 14, 2025).

#### **BRAZIL TARIFF MODS**

On November 20, President Trump issued an Executive Order (EO) modifying the IEEPA Brazil Tariffs imposed on July 30. Articles added to the exclusion list include agricultural products such as coffee, beef, spices, and tropical fruits and fruit juices. These exemptions are retroactive to November 13. 90 Fed. Reg. 54467 (Nov. 26, 2025).

# **SOUTH KOREA TRADE DEAL**

Following the November 13 Joint Fact Sheet, the U.S. Representative (USTR) and Department of Commerce have issued Notice the on а implementation of tariff-related aspects of the U.S.-South Korea trade deal. For South Korea products, if the Column 1 duty rate is less than 15%, then the combined Column 1 and IEEPA Reciprocal Tariff rate is 15%, and if the Column 1 rate is 15% or more, then the Reciprocal Tariff rate is 0%. This treatment has been implemented retroactively products subject to the Section 232 Auto Tariffs entered on or after November 1 and November 14 for goods described in Part B of an Annex that includes IEEPA Reciprocal Tariffs and Section 232 Wood Products Tariffs. #### **IEEPA TARIFF REFUNDS**

·A number of importers recently filed lawsuits in the U.S. Court of International Trade (CIT) as a strategy to protect their rights to obtain refunds of IEEPA additional tariffs if the Supreme Court strikes down the IEEPA-based tariffs in its upcoming Learning Resources and V.O.S. Selections decision. On December 15, the CIT issued an Order denying their request for an injunction, reasoning that the government has already taken the position that liquidation will not affect the availability of refunds and the CIT has the authority to order reliquidation. Speaking at a New York Times event on December 3, Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent downplayed the likelihood of widespread tariff refunds and said the administration can recreate the exact tariff structure with additional tariffs under Sections 301, 232, and 122 if the Supreme Court strikes down the IEEPA-based additional tariffs.

#### **NVIDIA 25% EXPORT FEES**

A December 8 social media post by President Trump stated that the U.S. will allow Nvidia to ship its H200 artificial intelligence (AI) processing units to approved customers in China and other countries, and "25% will be paid to the United States of America." The post also stated that the Department of Commerce is finalizing the details, and the same approach will apply to AMD, Intel, and other American companies. The potential implementation of an export fee or tax should draw careful scrutiny from all exporters. Contact Sean Murray or Chuck Ballard with questions.

# 232 TARIFF INCLUSIONS

The Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) has reportedly delayed issuing decisions on the September 2025 round of Section 232 steel and aluminum derivatives tariff inclusion requests until next year. BIS has, however, posted the more than 2,500 public comments.

#### **USMCA HEARINGS**

USTR held public hearings December 3-5 as part of the Six-Year Joint Review of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) scheduled for July 1, 2026. The USTR hearing notice has lists of scheduled witnesses and provisional transcripts from each day of the hearings.

#### **USMCA AUTO TRADE**

USTR has issued a Notice inviting comments on the operation of the USMCA with respect to automotive goods, including the USMCA rules of origin for automotive goods, as well as whether the automotive provisions of the USMCA are effective in light of technological and production advances. Comments are due by January 7. 90 Fed. Reg. 56247 (Dec. 5, 2025).

### 232 VEHICLES AND PARTS

The Commerce Department is accepting comments until January 26, 2026, to assess the information it is collecting for reviewing and deciding applications for import adjustment offsets under the Section 232 duty programs for autos, medium- and heavy-duty vehicles, buses, and parts. 90 Fed. #### TRADE FRAUD

The Department of Justice (DOJ) h a s charged an Indonesian company, its Indonesia co-owner, and two Indonesia and Italian employees with conspiracy to commit wire fraud, alleging a large-scale Customs duty and tariff evasion scheme where more than \$85 million in duties were evaded since 2021 by shipping more than \$1.2 billion in jewelry made in Indonesia to Jordan before sending it to the U.S. falsely claiming duty-free treatment under the U.S. Jordan Free Trade Agreement.

#### **HTSUS 9817 HANDICAPPED**

CBP has proposed to modify 19 Customs rulings to reject the treatment of certain ramps as articles for the handicapped in HTSUS subheading 9817.00.96. CBP acknowledges that the ramps for permanently used handicapped wheelchair users, but contends the ramps may also be used for other purposes. This proposal would result in a substantial duty increase. Comments are due by January 3. 59 Cust. B & Dec. 41 (Nov. 26, 2025).

#### HTS 2033

The U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) is requesting proposals for the World Customs Organization to amend the Harmonized Tariff Schedule (HTS) nomenclature at the international level for 2033. Commenters may suggest new HTS provisions, the deletion of provisions with low trade

The decrease in FTZ Board staffing and the federal government shutdown have caused time delays. The 2024 Annual Report has not been issued. Generally, all FTZ Board actions have slowed. Increased information is being required for all Applications.

Production Authorizations for pharmaceuticals have received one and three-year time limits. Some pharmaceutical companies are required to submit Active Pharmaceutical Ingredient (API) sources to the FTZ Board for review. 90 Fed. Reg. 54290 (Nov. 26, 2025); 90 Fed. In other industries, some Production Authorizations have included three-year limitations and requirements to annually report global and domestic sourcing information. # **UK PHARMA DUTY EXEMPTION**

USTR, along with Commerce and Health and Human Services, announced on December 1 that the U.S.agreed to exempt United Kingdom (U.K.) ingredients and pharmaceutical products and medical technology from Section 232 tariffs and future 301 investigations and tariffs as part of the U.S.-U.K. Prosperity **Deal**. In Economic exchange, the U.K committed to an "agreement in principle" to raise the net price that the U.K. National Health Service pays for new medications by 25%.

#### **AIR CARGO SCREENING**

CBP has issued an Interim Rule effective November 21, with a one-year informed compliance period, that enhances the mandatory data elements required on the Air Cargo Advance Screening filings. Within the year, CBP will be initiating the Verified Known Consignor data element as part of a known shipper program that will confer trusted trade partner benefits on vetted trade entities. # **FOOD SUPPLY CHAIN**

President Trump issued Executive Order 14364 on December 6 to address anti-competitive practices in the U.S. food supply chain. A Food Supply Chain Security Task Force will investigate the presence of such practices in domestic and foreign food-related entities, carry out enforcement actions, recommend new regulatory measures, and provide regular briefings to Congress to support potential legislative action. 90 Fed. Reg. 57349 (Dec. 6, 2025).

#### **3PL CTPAT PILOT**

CBP has created a Customs Trade Partnership Against Terrorism (CTPAT) pilot program for third-party logistics (3PL) providers. CBP wants to determine if including asset and non-asset based 3PL providers meets CTPAT program goals. Clients should encourage 3PL service providers to participate. 90 Fed. Reg. 52690 (Nov. 21, 2025).

#### **WRO - MAURITIUS GARMENTS**

CBP has issued a Withhold Release Order (WRO) on garments made by Firemount Group of Mauritius, indicating that Firemount has been using forced labor to manufacture some garments being exported to the U.S. CSMS #66848932 (Nov. 18, 2025).

#### **FISHERIES**

CBP has warned importers that effective January 1, certain fish and fish products from a number of countries will be banned unless accompanied by a Certification of Admissibility (COA). Additional information on the subject countries and products is available from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA). #### **WOOD PACKAGING**

CBP has issued a reminder that after December 31, wood packaging materials (WPM) imported into the U.S. must have a hyphen between the International Standard for Organization (ISO) country code and the facility code of the facility that treated the wood. #### **VESSEL CARGO DECS**

#### **PIPING MODULE HTSUS**

CBP has ruled that a piping module featuring pipes, valves, sensors, and gauges to control and monitor chilled water flow should be classified as a valve assembly in HTSUS subheading 8481.80.9050 (2% duty rate) rather than as a part of refrigerating equipment in Heading 8418. NY N355590 (Nov. 19, 2025).

#### **OFAC SANCTIONS PENALTY**

On December 4, the Office of Foreign Asset Controls (OFAC) announced was penalizing Inc., Gracetown а property management company based in New York, \$7,139,305. Gracetown was accused of receiving 24 payments from Oleg Deripaska, a sanctioned person, even after being told by OFAC that accepting payments and not reporting assets, was prohibited.

#### TRADE SECRETS CASE

A federal jury has convicted Ji Wang, a Chinese immigrant working for Corning Inc., of stealing sensitive defense research related to fiber lasers while negotiating with Chinese government entities to start a fiber business in China.
